

At Convocation



"This generation is the same all over the world," was one of the comments of Mr. Daniel Goe, the main speaker at the convocation held Monday at 1:35 in the auditorium.

The convocation, sponsored by the Red Cross Youth, featured Mr. Goe, Head of a Liberian high school, and Mr. Keith Hewitt, a Peace Corps representative who served three years in Brazil.

Mr. Goe encouraged WHS to participate in the School Partnership program. Money would be raised by the school to help build a school overseas.

The need for better facilities in Liberia was stressed by the fact that only about two out of every 100 students in Mr. Goe's school district make it to high school. The national average of Liberia's high school attendance is about 10% of the students able to attend.

Mr. Goe, whose father died when he was 7, had to work to

earn enough money to attend elementary, junior high, and high school as well as college. He recently received his Master's degree from Kansas State University.

Mr. Hewitt, who introduced Mr. Goe, also presented the film, Not Enough. The film

STUDENTS

What is Distributive Education? Distributive Education is a combined study and on-the-job training program designed to improve the efficiency of persons engaged in distributive occupations such as salespeople, buyers, managers, and sales supporting personnel in retail, wholesale, and service businesses. Its distinguishing characteristics the mutually planned working arrangement between the school and the employer. The students receive classroom instruction directly related to their work in the cooperating business organization. The students receive on-the-job supervised training from their employer. The senior student works a minimum of fifteen hours per week (at least 50 percent during school hours) for which he receives pay and credit towards graduation.

The student benefits by receiving occupational orientation to the business world. He acquires a background of training which contributes to more rapid promotion in a distributive occupation. He acquires sales ability, job intelligence, technical knowledge, and a wealth of merchandise information regarding products and services. He gains an understanding as to what the employer expects of his personnel. (Continued on Page 4)

Thespians Present



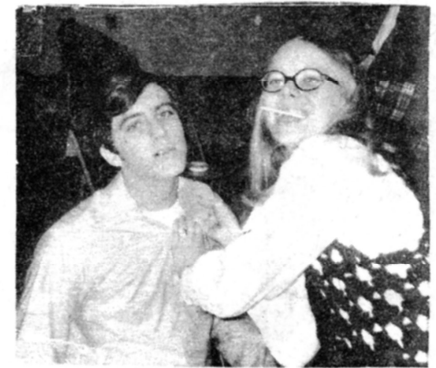
Steve Riney and Pat Czirr are not holding hands, they are just putting on make-up for the performance.

GERMAN STUDENTS PRESENT STORIES TO CLASSES

German I students are getting initiated on their first oral recital in their classes this week. Each student is supposed to write a story in German and recite it before the class. The purpose is to get them to understand the language better and speak more fluently.

Telling short stories in German by memory is the task German II students are struggling through. This also helps them to better understand the foreign language.

What Are They?

Mrs. Traylor's Latin I classes are now writing mythology notebooks. They are seeking as much information as possible about the following: Iris, Janus, Jupiter, Mercury, Apollo, Aurora, Juno, and Ceres, Cupid, Persephone, Bacchus, Triton, Neptune, Aelus, Diana, Minerva, Venus and Hebe; Fates, Mars, Vesta, and Ganymede. After group discussions on these items, the students will be quizzed on them.

Every six weeks the students are responsible for a derivative notebook which contains a list of all the vocabulary they have studied and English words they have found derived from that Latin word.
