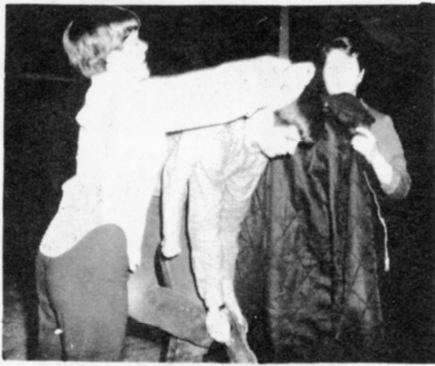


# Juniors To Give 'January Thaw'

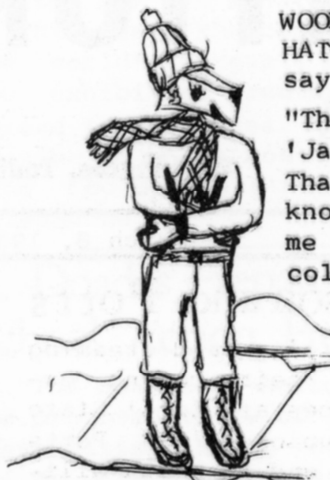

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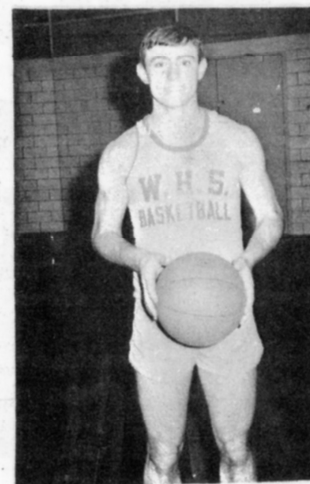

Modern teaching which puts the "why" and background of a technique in the limelight is currently used in Art I and II classes.

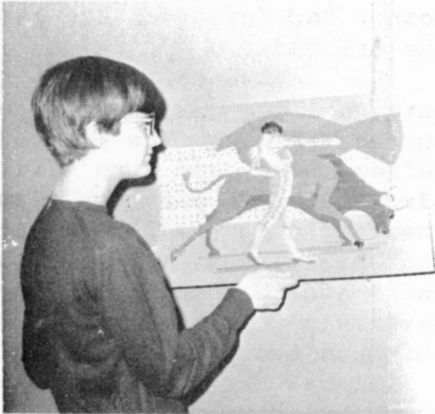

## Meat May Cause Disease

Do you prefer to eat meat well-done or rare? If the answer is "rare," talk to one of the students in Mr. David Kinman's freshman biology classes.

Biology students are studying a disease known as trichinosis. This disease is caused by roundworm (trichinella spiralis) which may be contracted from pork. These worms enter the body by the consumption of infected or inadequately cooked pork.

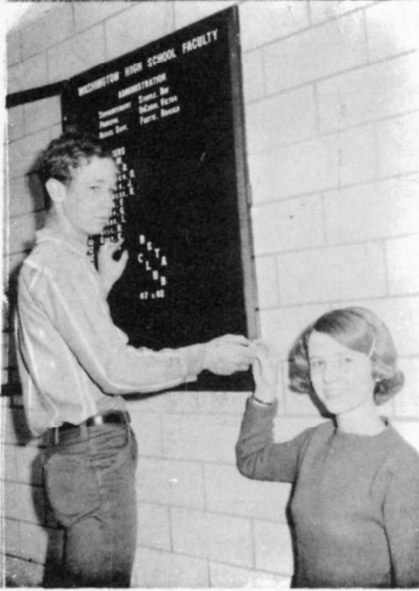

In a loud roaring fashion, the Hatchets nailed their third straight sectional championship and thirtieth one in 43 years of sectional competition by beating the St. John Eagles, 57-36.

Both teams fought the battle on even terms in the first half with a score of 24-21 at the break.

After intermission, the Hatchets steadily increased their lead until the final outcome was a 21 point advantage.

Fred White and Larry Buhr led the Hatchet scoring with 16 and 15 points, respectively. Wayne Smith also added 10 points for the scoring attack.

WAYNE SMITH No 24 goes up for another basket in the first game of sectional action against the Cardinals.

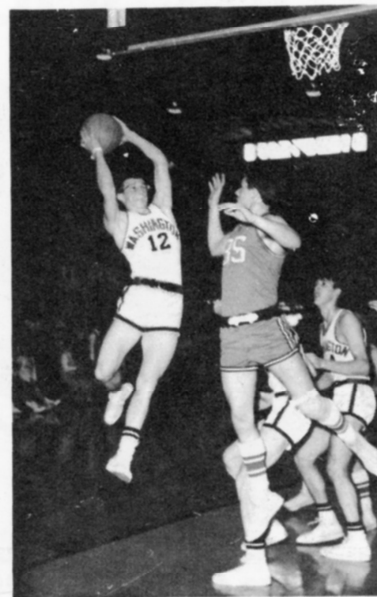

## Supt. Stuffle Attends Administrator Conference

Supt. Roy Stuffle recently attended the 100th annual conference of the American Association of School Administrators in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Mr. Stuffle was among the 30,000 registrants who attend many of the 300 clinics and nine general sessions.

The conference, held to keep school officials abreast of current methods and innovations of teaching, featured national figures at the various general sessions speaking on education-related topics.

The conference also featured exhibits by 700 school supply dealers. The exhibits alone would have taken 15 days to see if each booth were visited for ten minutes.

This year the conference, the world's largest, outgrew the exhibition center and spread into two near by hotels proving to be the most impressive and helpful to all in attendance.

## C. Doades Prepares School Action Program

"The School in Action" is the proposed title of a slide presentation being compiled by Mr. Clifford Doades, director of instruction.

The slides will show various aspects of education and the facilities of the Washington Community Schools from elementary through the high school level.

Principals of the schools have suggested pictures that should be taken at their respective schools. After all pictures are taken, they will be arranged in order and a summary written to explain the slides.

The presentation can then be used to show groups an over all view of the school system, and the teaching techniques used in different classes.

## Hatchets Lose Regional

Finishing with a 16-8 record, the Hatchets ended the fine record by losing in the Regional Tournament by the score of 80 to 57. The defeat came from the hands of the Cloverdale Clovers, who were defeated in the final game by the Vincennes Alices, 87 to 57.

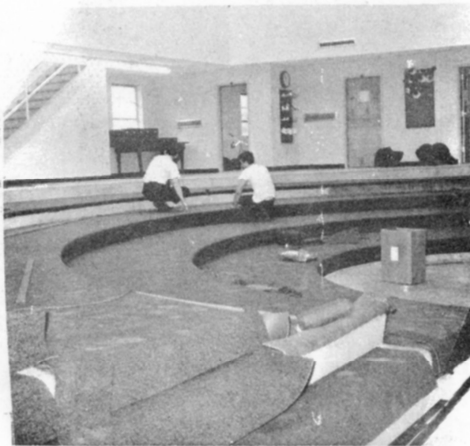
Although leading at first the Hatchets were hit by a foul plague which retired three of the starters.
