

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If A Tornado Strikes

Of all winds that sweep this planet's surface, tornadoes are the most violent. Their time on earth is short, and their destructive paths are small. But these shortlived, local storms through populated areas leave a path of terrible destruction.

In seconds, a tornado can change a thriving street into shambles, and hope into despair.

Tornadoes occur in many parts of the world and in all 50 states. No area is more suseptible to their formation, than the continental plains of North America.and no season is free from them.

Normally, the number of tornadoes is at its lowest in the United States during December and January, and highest in May. Months of greatest total frequency are April, May, and June.

No community is entirely free from the threat of tornadoes so everyone should be acquainted with the guidlines.

IN office buildings, stand in an interior hallway on a lower floor, preferably the basement. In factories, move quickly to the section of the plant offering greatest protection according to advance plans. In homes, seek shelter under a sturdy workbench or heavy table, preferably in the basement. If there is no basement, take cover under heavy furniture in the center part of the house. Keep some windows open, but stay away from them!

In school, go into an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums. In open country, move away from the tornados path at a right angle. Lie flat in the nearest depression such as a ditch or ravine.

Radio and television stations will broadcast the latest tornado advisory information. Call the weather bureau only to report a tornado.




Miss Smith is shown here grading papers for Miss Hilbert's gym class.

Hatchets Lose Meet In Close Shave



Dick Jones, Hatchet trackman, was also a triple winner by winning the high hurdles with a time of 17.2 seconds, the low hurdles in 23.0 seconds, and the pole vault with a height of 11'6".

Fred White won the shot put event with a heave of 41'6", and Steve White, a Hatchet sophomore, won the two mile with a time of 11:13.

The Patriots ended the meet with 60 points while the Hatchets accumulated a close 58.
