Washington High School has set another enrollment record this year. The total enrollment is 970 students and 55 faculty members. This is the largest number of students ever attending WHS. Of the 970 students, there are 490 girls and 480 boys. So, as you can see, the girls hold a margan of 10 students.

Of the 490 girls at WHS this year, 93 of them are seniors, 128 are juniors, 127 are sophomores, and 142 them are freshmen. Of the 480 boys this year, 116 are seniors, 112 are juniors, 112 are sophomores, and 140 are freshmen.

The largest class at WHS this year is the freshmen cllass with 282 students. The juniors are second with 240 students with the sophomores right behind them with 239 students. The senior class is smallest this year with 209 students.


