. look so forlorn!


Just thank your lucky stars that we don't all play French Horn!"



5- Hatchets traveled to Bloomington and defeated the Panthers in a last quarter rally 53-47.


6- Hatchets came home and defeated the Bedford Stonecutters 60-57.
