MONEY IS KEY WORD IN PARTICIPATION

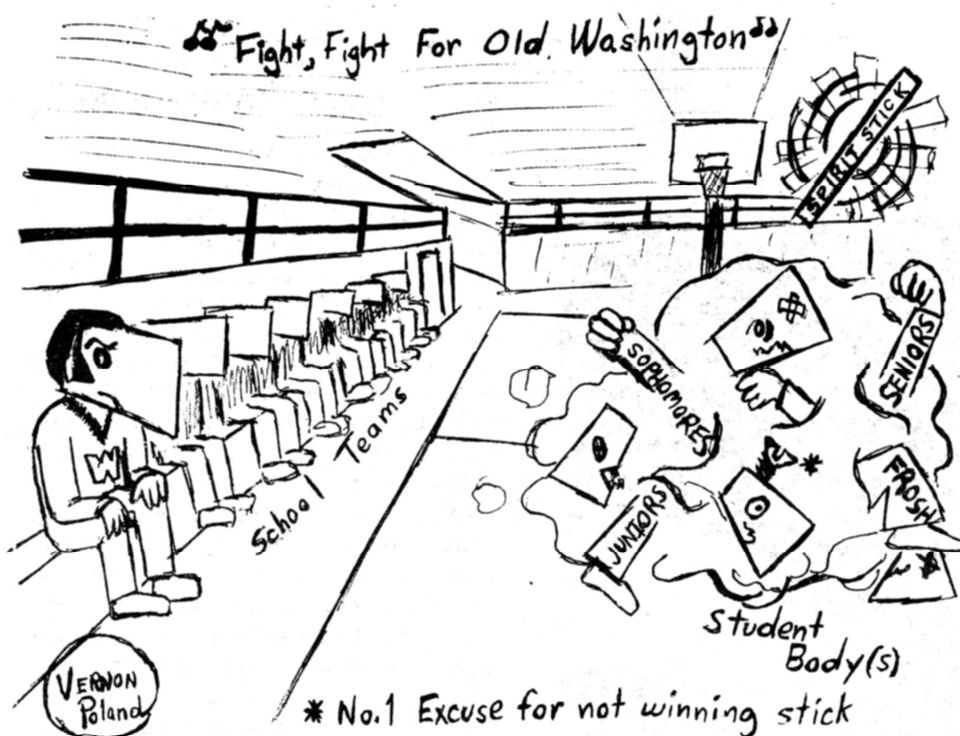
A school, physically, is nothing more than a brick building. Inside that building many activities are carried on each day.

WHS Homecoming festivities officially start this evening with a special parade.

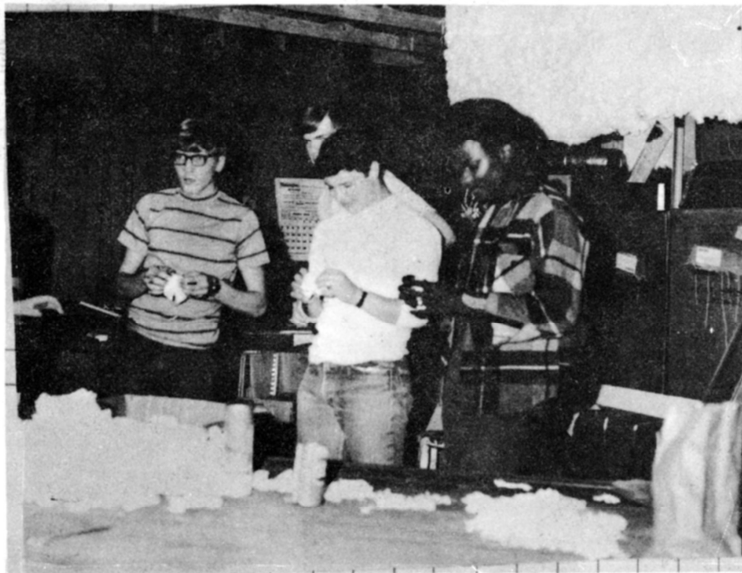

Mt. Vernon. Tonite's game starts at 8:00 pm.

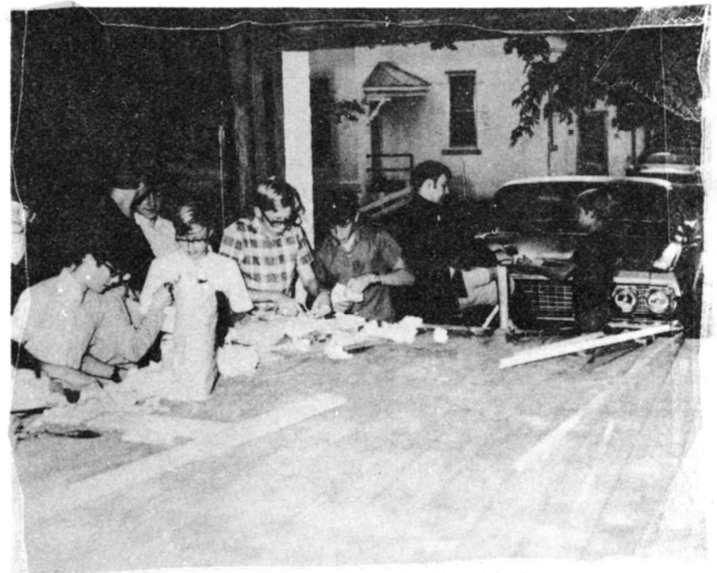

HATCHETS EXPLODE FOR FIRST VICTORY OF SEASON!

WHS won their first game of the season, a 22-21 squeaker over the Boonville Pioneers.

Karl Klumper scored two touchdowns and Jim Kaarre scored one.

WHS gained 76 yards rushing on the ground and 150 yards passing, completing 8-20 tries. The Hatchets had seven first downs.

Boonville rushed on the ground for 168 yards but passed for only 25 yards completing 3 of 17. The Pioneers had eight first downs.

The Hatchets are now 1-2 while Boonville dropped to 0-3.

Hatchets hurt in passing game

The Hatchets bowed to the North Knox Warriors Friday night at Hatchet Hollow by a score of 36-6.

The Hatchets scored their only touchdown by a four yard run by Don Brawley. A two point conversion by Jim Kaarre was incomplete.

The Warriors scored on a 34 yard run and scored in the second, 14 in the third, and 8 in the fourth quarter.

The Hatchets had 90 yards rushing and 30 yards passing.

The Warriors had 192 yards rushing and 106 yards passing. Kaarre was 3-10-1 in passing and Randy Smith intercepted a pass in the second quarter.

The Hatchets are now 1-3 at the warriors 3-0-1.

THUNDERBIRDS FLY OVER HATCHETS

The Hatchets were defeated by the North Central Thunderbirds by a score of 36-6 last Friday night.

WHS scored the first touchdown of the game when quarterback Jim Kaarre, junior, ran the ball from the one yard line. Steve Sommers set up the touchdown when he recovered a Thunderbird fumble. The Hatchets' defense held the Thunderbirds from scoring in the first quarter.

North Central scored two touchdowns in the second quarter and scored twice in the third quarter with two, two-point conversions. The

Thunderbirds scored their last touchdown in the fourth quarter adding a two-point conversion.

The Hatchets put together a drive from their won 20 yard line to the Thunderbirds' 19 yard line but the pass by Karl Klumper was intercepted.

Kaarre completed 5 of 8 passes for 67 yards. The Thunderbirds were 3 of 10 for 11 yards.
