



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HATCHETS LOSE TO SIAC LEADER

ALICES SPOILED FINAL HOME GAME

WHS lost to the number one team in the SIAC, the Jasper Wildcats, by a score of 47-0.

The Hatchets moved the hall to the Wildcats three-yard line but at the start of the fourth quarter they fumbled. Jum Kaarre tried a pass from the 19-yard line but was intercepted on the one yard line.

Kaarre passed to Karl Kluemper from the Wildcats' 25-yard line and Kluemper

went in to score but the play was called back.

Wildcats scored 13 points in the first quarter, 21 in the second, 13 in the third, and the Hatchets held them from scoring in the fourth.

The Hatchets had 107 passing yards of which Kluemper had 103. Kaarre was 10-29-3 in passing.

The Wildcats had 62 passing yards and were 7-13-2 in quarterbacking.

Sparked by a powerful offense, the Vincennes Alices spoiled the Hatchets' final home football game of the season by the score of 40 to 0.

Vincennes ran for a 53 yard touchdown on the 2nd play of the game. Everything was in favor of Vincennes and the half 33-0.

The Hatchets' defense improved the second half only allowing one touchdown, in the third quarter. The offense also played well but failed to score.

The victory improved Vincennes record to 5 wins and 2 losses while the loss was the seventh in eight starts for the Hatchets.
