Second play of year underway

The first great modern drama that rocked Europe, "Ghosts" written by Henrik Ibsen, will be presented by the Thespian Club.

Five leading roles make up this play. Mrs. Alving, the main character, is trying to put down the ancient haunting ghosts of the past which

At twenty he returns to his Norweign country home to celebrate the opening of an orphanage built by his mother in memory of his late father, Captian Alving. Regina, Mrs. Alving's maid, and her father, Jacob Engstrand, a carpenter, perform services for Mrs. Alving.

The play will be presented on February 9 and 10 at 8:00 pm in the WHS auditorium.

Sunday, December 13th, the WHS Choral Department presented its annual Christmas Vesper Hour. The concert was held at 3:00 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

Music was provided by the Concert, Girls, Mixed, and Freshman choirs. A small portion of the program was presented by the Madrigal group.

The timed test consisted of 90 questions and one essay.

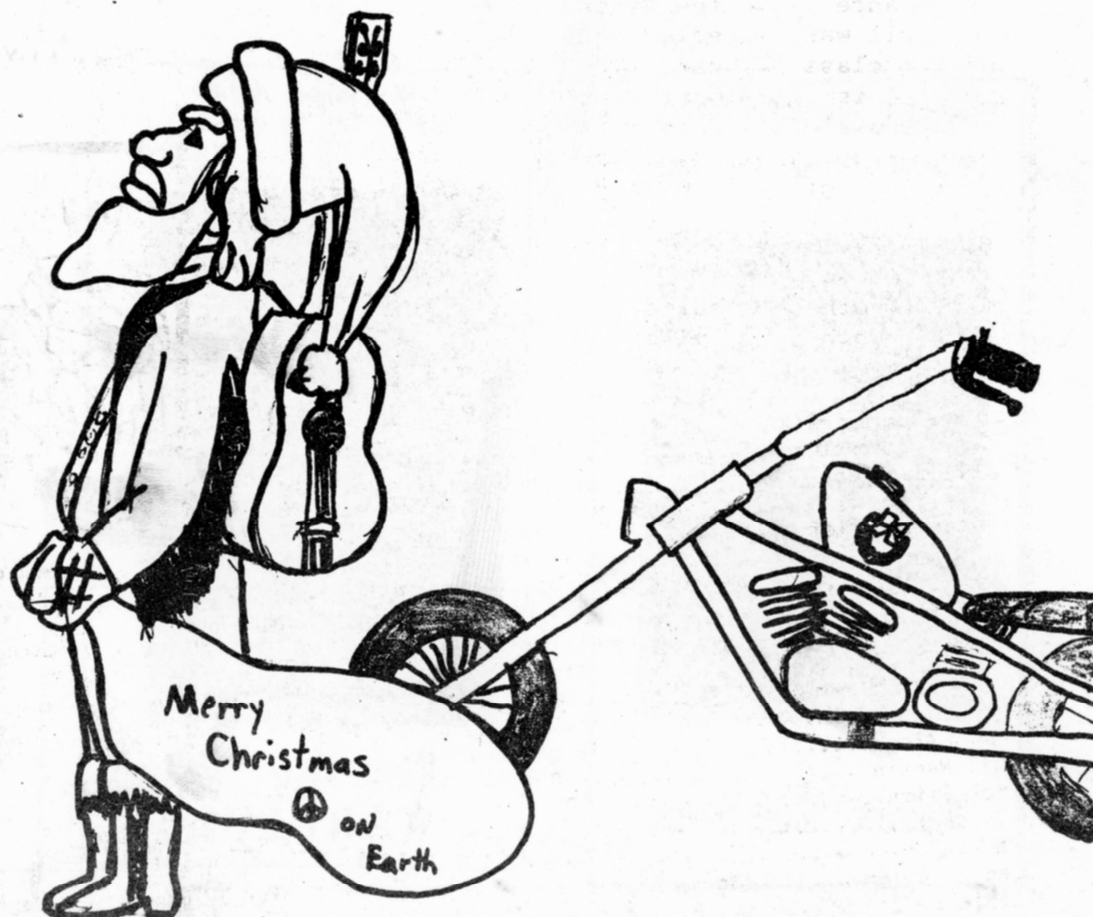
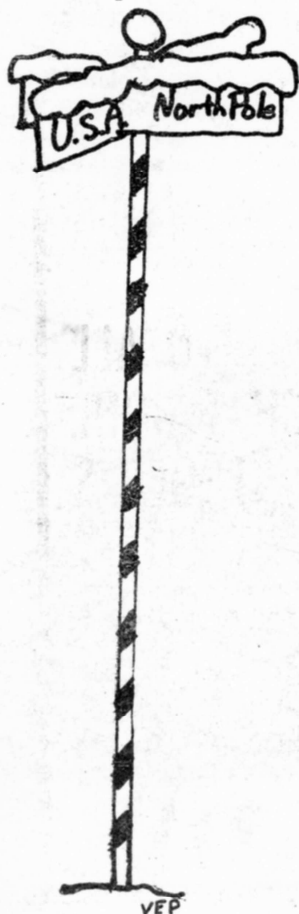
Blue Goose strikes

Tim Armes, senior guard, was named player of the week in Indiana High School Basketball. Armes scored 18 points when he came off the bench, after Buhr had fouled out. Armes helped lead the Hatchets over the North Daviess Cougars 73-64 for the Hatchets second win of the season.

The 5'10" senior hit 7 of 9 field goals and had a perfect night at the charity line hitting 4 of 4 shots. Armes also helped with two rebounds.

Armes lifted the Hatchets several times. One was in the closing minutes of the third quarter when he scored two points to help give the Hatchets a lead of 49 to 45.

The small guard also made two points in the fourth quarter to give the Hatchets a lead to win the game.

Armes commented, "When I went into the game we were in foul trouble, so I thought I would do the best I could." He also commented, "It was hard to believe that I was picked player of the week. I guess I had a 'Hot Hand'."

Wrestling Hatchets lose first

The Wrestling Hatchets were defeated in their first tough match against Rex Mundi on their home floor by a score of 51-3.

The Hatchets only score came when Jerry Reed, comeback from a broken foot last season, to win a decision 7-1.

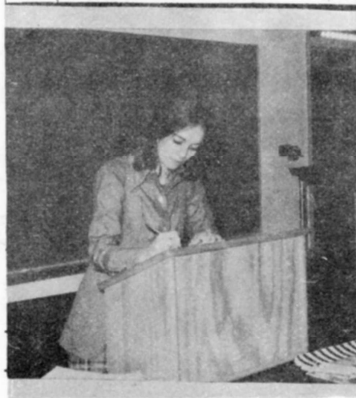
